To create in our students a sense of:




Initiative and Openness to life's Opportunities: which will foster an optimistic, grateful approach to life in general and an ability to cope with difficulties.

New Junior Cycle

Junior Cycle

All first year students will study the new specification for the Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement (JCPA). In Marist College we provide a taster programme, whereby 1st Year students experience all option subjects prior to selecting their chosen subjects.

The new JCPA affords a significant continuity of experience for each student as he makes the transition from primary to post-primary school. The JCPA provides greater choice of learning experiences in the curriculum and facilitates the development of eight Key Skills. Key skills support students in how they learn and to take responsibility for their own learning.

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Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme (LCVP)

The Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme (LCVP) is a Senior Cycle programme designed to give a strong vocational dimension to the Leaving Certificate. The programme gears students towards self-directed learning, being innovative and enterprising and acquiring attitudes and skills appropriate to the world of work. Students who are eligible to take the Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme follow the Leaving Certificate curriculum as usual, in addition to two Link Modules - Preparation for the World of Work and Enterprise Education.

Transition Year

The Transition Year programme aims to promote the personal, social, educational and vocational development of students and to prepare them for their role as autonomous, participative and responsible members of society.

The emphasis in Transition Year is on self-directed learning and the curriculum attempts to provide breadth and balance to cater for varied interests and potential. The year is designed to provide a bridge to help students make the transition from a highly structured and exam-orientated environment to one where they will take greater responsibility for their own learning and decision-making.

During Transition Year we aim to utilise a wide variety of approaches to teaching and learning, including activity-based learning, group work, project work and educational trips.

The overall aims of Transition Year are:

- Education for maturity, with an emphasis on social awareness and increased social competence.
- Education through experience of adult and working life as a basis for personal development and maturity.
- Promotion of general, technical and academic skills with an emphasis on inter-disciplinary and self-directed learning.

At Marist College we strongly believe in the importance of providing our students with a wide range of educational experiences both inside and outside the classroom.



World Finalists 2019 in Abu Dhabi




"To help change the perceptions of science, technology, engineering and maths by creating a fun and exciting learning environment for young people."

This is a competition offering a way to learn Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) related subjects in an exciting way. It takes place in 40 countries with 20 million students participating. Marist College Athlone has been one of the leading schools in Ireland in this competition over the last few years and has represented Ireland at the World Finals in 2019 in Abu Dhabi, 2016 in Texas and 2017 in Malaysia.

CanSat European Winners

A CanSat is a simulation of a real satellite, integrated within the volume and shape of a soft drink can. The challenge for the students is to fit all the major subsystems found in a satellite, such as power, sensors and a communication system, into this minimal volume. The CanSat is then launched to an altitude of a few hundred metres by a rocket or dropped from a platform or captive balloon and its mission begins: to carry out a scientific experiment and achieve a safe landing.

Marist Cansat team represented Ireland at the European Cansat Finals in the Azores last June. They competed against 17 European Countries to claim the top prize. They also hold the title for Irish National Champions 2018. The competition is run by SFI (Science Foundation Ireland) and ESA (European Space Agency). They are the first Irish team to win the top prize at the European level.





21st Century Learning

What is 21st Century Learning?

At Marist College, we believe in nourishing an education which promotes the well-rounded, 21st Century pupil. Through cross-curricular activities, focus on academic achievement and the promotion of extra-curricular fulfilment our students are educated with the learning, literacy and wellbeing at the heart of modern education.

Our focus is to provide students with an educational structure which encourages collaboration, creative initiative and critical thinking. These skills and focuses, which are central to the teaching methods of our staff, form the core elements of not only 21st century learning but also the new Junior Cycle currently being implemented.

Here at Marist College, we strongly feel that our pupils are sufficiently prepared to address the range of interpersonal, creative and technologically centred skills at the heart of the modern Irish educational system.

Monitoring Progress


